Free Eye Clinics in India

I went to India at the request of Peace Proclamation Ministries International (PPMI) to resource Pastoral Leadership with a keen awareness of how difficult it is to communicate the good news of Jesus across cultural lines. Proclaiming the good news of Jesus in a culture to which I am a stranger

requires more than words which are so easily misunderstood, especially in a context where hate and conflict between religions and cultures is so evident. Expressions of love and compassion are required to communicate love and the way of Jesus.

It was exciting for me to see local rural pastors setting up Free Eye Clinics to invite anyone from the community to come and have their eyes examined. One of our first stops was to visit an Eye Clinic where persons who had been examined were receiving eye glasses for the first time. Hindus, Muslims, Christians and anyone else gathered for the occasion, as a local Christian Eye Specialist prepared to hand out prescription lenses. We were privileged and invited to bless the occasion in the name of Jesus and then help in distributing and placing the eye glasses on their face! What a joy to see the smiles and deep appreciation by the recipients as we they received their eye glasses.

On another occasion later in our trip we visited another eye clinic where the same Christian Eye Specialist was present to do examinations for another group of persons. Again the local pastor extended an invitation to anyone in the local village to come and be examined. Many people from different backgrounds and religions gathered as we observed and blessed them as they received their examinations. This is one of the new and very exciting parts of the ministry we saw happening in India through PPMI. This has become a new channel that God's love is being communicated to people regardless of where they come from. PPMI continues to seek new ways in which to share God's love in these interior rural and some villages.
